The Doan Outlaws: Graves Outside The Cemetery

Yes, the graves of Doan outlaws, Abraham and Levi, who were hanged in Philadelphia on 24 September 1788, are outside the cemetery walls. They are buried near the Plumstead Friends Meeting House in the village now called Gardenville, PA in Bucks County.

The pictures included here were taken recently by John and Mary Jane Whitesell. As a boy, John helped his father mow the lawn in and around the church cemetery. At that time, the graves outside the wall were a mystery with secret overtones. He always wondered what had happened to these men and why they were buried outside the church cemetery walls. He had heard rumors but didn't know the story until he learned of our interest in the Doane Family Association.

We have sent John photocopies of some genealogy information from "The Doane Family" (Volume I), including pages 241-244 which give an excellent account of the details leading up to the hangings. It is also interesting to note that the mothers of Abraham (234) and Levi (230) were sisters (Hester and Rachel) who had married Doan brothers Joseph (96) and Israel (98).

You will also find interesting reading about Joseph (96) on pages 126-130. Some of these

Doans moved to Canada and settled only eight miles west of our home in Niagara Falls. Please note, however, that MY branch of the Doanes was from New England and not closely related to these. Our outlaws haven't been revealed, YET!



I recently came into possession of a *Doan's* Directory of the United States 1915-16. This book gives the population of all incorporated places that had 1,000 or more people in the 1910 census, and it is alphabetized by states.

In addition to the census information, there are numerous (and humorous) testimonials of persons whose health had been restored with Doan's Kidney Pills, Doan's Regulets and/or Doan's Ointment.

According to the directory, so great was the demand for Doan's Kidney Pills in foreign countries that branch houses had to be established in London, Paris, Brussels, Amsterdam, Milan, Cairo, Capetown, Bombay, Shanghai, Honolulu, Rio De Janeiro and Buenos Aires. The public was advised to see that the package bears the Maple Leaf trademark and the signature "James Doan."

Does anyone own one of these directories? I am enamored with its contents — especially when I read that Doan's Kidney Pills has made old age easier for thousands of elderly folks. If we are looking for an elixir for youth, and who of us isn't, we can rejoice because one of our very own has supplied the magic potion!

newsletter, apothecary antiques brought healthy prices at a Howard Parzow auction in Gaithersburg, Maryland. One particular item mentioned was DOAN'S THERMOMETER, which was sold for \$275. Have any of you ever seen one, or do you have one in your possession?

The following are two of many articles that can be found in the Doan's Directory of the United States. All of the articles in the directory include accounts of the incredible curing abilities of Doan's Kidney Pills (for various conditions), Doan's Regulets (for constipation), and Doan's Ointment (for piles, eczema and itching skin). All stories are notarized by members of the Notary Public.

Helpless As a Child




