Make Plans To Attend The Next DFA Reunion— Bucks County, Pennsylvania Site Chosen

Interest has been high for a reunion in this area, due to the notorious reputation of the Doan Outlaws who resided in Bucks County beginning in the mid-1700s. Termed "Revolutionary era Robin Hoods," this band of five brothers and one cousin were considered robbers, felons, burglars, spies, and traitors. A highlight of the reunion will be a Doan Trail Tour with stops at the Doan family homestead, Plumstead Meetinghouse, Doan's Tavern, Pipersville Inn, Devil's Hole, Doan Cave, the village of Newtown, and other significant sites that the outlaws frequented.

There are numerous historical and recreational sites in the Bucks County area which will provide an excellent opportunity for sightseeing. See covered bridges, wineries, and museums; and experience unique shopping in New Hope, Newtown, and Peddler's Village. Bucks County is within easy driving distance of Philadelphia; Valley Forge National Park; Gettysburg National Historic Park; Washington, D.C.; New York City; Atlantic City; and Hershey Park.

A group of DFA members met in Doylestown in June to discuss the reunion. Catriona Le May Doan, Award-Winning Speed Skater

Catriona Le May Doan eclipsed her own world record in the 500 metres at the Olympic Oval in Calgary, Canada, in January 2001. Doan and her husband, Bart, are natives of Saskatoon. Even Bart is amazed at how good she is. Three hours after setting a record in the 500 metres, Doan set a Canadian record in the 1,000 metres. Winning is normal for her, as she finished first in the World Cup standings in 1998 and 1999, although dropping to fourth in 2000. Other stops during the year, were the World Cup Circuit in Germany, Finland, Holland, then the finale in Calgary in early March.

In Germany, Doan won the gold medal in the women's 500 metres and remained undefeated internationally this season in six races. In The Netherlands, she continued her amazing season in World Cup long-track speed skating with victories in the 500 and 1,000 metres. This was her seventh victory in eight 500-metre races this season. It was her first victory in the 1,000, and first double gold performance on the same day since a World Cup in Japan in December 1998. She entered The Netherlands race 10^{th} in the 1,000 World Cup standings. She leads the overall standings in the 500 metres with 770 points. Doan is a former gold medallist.

Recent Donations to the Archives



(Vermilion) - Mary A. Doane, 86, of Vermilion, formerly of Lorain, died Friday, Feb. 9, 2001, at Community Health Partners, in Lorain, following a lengthy illness.

She was born June 25, 1914, in Cleveland, moving to Lorain in the early 1940s. She moved to Vermilion in 1991.

Mrs. Doane worked as manager of the former Sutter's Restaurant, Lorain, for 20 years, until her retirement in 1960.

She was a member of the First Congregational Church, Lorain, where she was a member and past chairman of the Board of Deaconesses and the Fellowship Supper Club. She was also a member and past president of Altrusa Service Club; former member of Lakeland Women's Club; and member of Wimodaugsis, all in Lorain; life member of the Doane Family Association of America; and a charter member of the Lorain Community Hospital Auxiliary, where she volunteered for more than 1,000 hours and helped establish the Auxiliary Snack Shop.

She enjoyed cooking, sewing, and travel.

Survivors include her son, Alan M. Doane; and daughter, Marsha L. Funk, both of Vermilion; and six grandchildren and two great-grandchildren. She was preceded in death by her husband, Neil Miller Doane (Vol. II, #1517), in 1983; 11 sisters; and her parents, Laszla and Elizabeth (nee Barko) Szabo.

(North Chatham) – David Robertson Doane died at his North Chatham home of cancer on Oct. 5. He was the husband of Evelyn Steelman Doane for 44 years. A *Mayflower* descendent, he was born in New Rochelle, N.Y., in 1936. He was a graduate of New Rochelle High School and received his bachelor of arts degree in economics in 1957 from Bucknell University, where he was a member of the 1956 golfteam MASCAA champions, vice president of Kappa Sigma fraternity, and a member of ROTC.

A First Lieutenant in the U.S. Army, Doane served in the 151st Engineer Corps, Fort Benning, Ga., where he was a company commander.

Following his military service, Doane was employed at Towers, Perrin, Forster & Crosby Reinsurance Company from 1960-86, where he became a vice president and director.

He was a former member of the Union League of Philadelphia and Huntingdon Valley County Club. At age 49, he retired and moved to Cape Cod, where he had spent summers since childhood. After his retirement, he bought a house in North Chatham built by his great-grandfather, Captain Rufus Nickerson.

He loved living on the Cape and enjoyed boating, lobstering, duck hunting, antique cars and playing golf at Eastward Ho!, where he was a member. He was involved in the community as former director of the Chatham Historical Society and former director of the Chatham Conservation Foundation, as well as serving on the harbor planning and waterways committees. He was also a member of the Cape Cod Antique Car Club

and the Cape Cod Model A Club.

Besides his wife, he is survived by one daughter, Deborah L. Doane of Laguna Beach, Calif.; one son, Jonathan Doane of Harwich; one grandson, Tyler Doane of Laguna Beach; his father, Carroll F. Doane of Fort Myers, Fla.; and a cousin, Hillary LeClaire of Chatham. His son, Dr. Jeffrey Doane, preceded him in death.

A celebration of his life was held at St. Christopher's Episcopal Church, Chatham. Memorial donations may be made to the church or Hospice of Cape Cod.

GENE DOAN

Gene Mustard Doan, 69, North Pekin, Ill., died Friday, May 19, 2000, at his residence.

Born Nov. 27, 1930, in Peoria, Ill., to Harry Clifford and Margaret Mustard Doan, he married Claire Ohlinger on Dec. 30, 1961, in Inglewood, Calif. Besides his widow, one sister, Catherine Doan, of Bullhead, Ariz., survives him. An infant brother preceded him in death.

Doan was a Korean Conflict veteran. A graduate of Northrop Aeronautical Institute, he worked for Caterpillar, Inc., for 32 years, last working as a test cell coordinator, retiring in December 1995.

Doan was a member of the Doan(e) Family Association of America. He was an active member of First Missionary Church where services were held on Tuesday, May 23, 2000.

Editor's Note: Gene presented a genealogical workshop at the 1980 DFA reunion at Earlham College. He was a great admirer of William Howard Doane's music, and To God Be the Glory was sung at his funeral.

CHARLES N. DOANE, JR.

Charles N. Doane, Jr., of Essex, Conn., died Sunday, Dec. 3, 2000. He was born in Essex, Jan. 6, 1912. He was the son of Charles N. Doane, Sr., and Edith Palau Doane.

Many local residents knew Doane, as he worked with his father selling meat, door to door, from a refrigerated delivery truck. The Doanes operated the business for more than three decades, including the Great Depression of the 1930s and World War II. He became postmaster in Essex, and served in that position until his retirement in 1974.

Doane was an active Democrat, and served five terms as a member of the Board of Selectmen in the 1950s. He also served on the Board of Finance, Zoning Board, and Zoning Board of Appeals. He was moderator at many town meetings. The Board of Selectmen honored Doane in May 1966 by proclaiming a "Charlie Doane Day," which recognized him as "an Essex original: farmer, gentleman, and friend." He was a member of Essex Congregational Church, Essex Historical Society, Democratic Town Committee, and Essex Land Trust. He was a charter member of the Essex Lions Club, and a trustee of the Essex Savings Bank. Doane served on the state commission that supervised the construction of the original Baldwin Bridge over the Connecticut River between Old Saybrook and Old Lyme.

Doane and his wife, Marion, were active members of the Doan(e) Family Association for many years. Doane was a reunion chairman, regional vice-president, and a member of the investment committee.

His wife preceded him in death. His son, Charles N. Doane III; his daughter, Jane Doane Anderson; his brother, Robert L. Doane; four grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren survive him.


