Daniel Doan Trail

Doane family members who live in, or will be visiting, New Hampshire, might like to hike the Daniel Doan Trail up Smarts Mountain. In 1993, the Dartmouth Outing Club named this trail after the legendary woodsman "in recognition of Daniel Doan's efforts to stimulate interest in hiking and the out-of-doors."

Daniel Doan is the author of two classic hiking books: 50 Hikes in the White Mountains and 50 More Hikes in New Hampshire. His other work includes a memoir: Our Last Backpack; a history of New Hampshire's north country; Indian Stream Republic: Settling a New England Frontier, 1784-1842; a book of exercises, Dan Doan's Fitness Program for Hikers and Cross-Country

Skiers; and two novels, The Crystal Years and Amos Jackson.

After his death in 1993, his daughter, novelist Ruth Doan MacDougall, assumed authorship of the hiking books. A description of the Daniel Doan Trail can be found in 50 Hikes in the White Mountains, Hike #15, Smarts Mountain. The trailhead is in Oxford, and the hike is six miles round trip, which will take about four and a half hours, not counting lunch and exploration of the fire tower on the 3,238 foot summit.

Obituaries

Dr. Kenneth R. Doane, Ed.D., dean of school of education

Dr. Kenneth R. Doane, Fullerton, Calif., a long-time member and supporter of the Doane Family Association, died April 13, 2001. He was born in Sparta, Wis., Feb. 12, 1918, to Ralph and Mabel Doane. He graduated from Sparta High School in 1935, and continued his education at Wisconsin State University, La Crosse. Ken went on to the University of Wisconsin, receiving both his master's and doctorate degrees in education. He taught at Montana State University and Hamline University, St. Paul, Minn. While at Hamline, he was recruited by California State University, Fullerton, where he was founding dean of the school of education. He served at California State for 41 years.

Doane was preceded in death by his parents, and wife, Eunice. He is survived by sons, Kendall in California and Bradley in Ohio; a brother, Dr. Ray Doane of Menomonie, Wis.; a sister, Belle Mae Sullivan, Sparta; and many special nieces and nephews. Memorial services were held at Morningside Presbyterian Church, Fullerton, and California State University.

Carroll F. Doane, map company executive; Harwich native; avid golfer

Fort Myers, Fla. – Carroll F. Doane, 96, a resident of Fort Myers, and formerly of Harwich, died Sunday, Jan. 20. He was husband of the late Rada Robertson and the late Jane Bell Walker. Born and raised in Harwich, he graduated valedictorian of his class at Harwich High School. Doane was a descendant of Deacon John Doane and William Nickerson. He loved to visit his grandfather who lived across the road from Elmer Crowell in East Harwich and was fascinated watching him carve his decoys. After graduation, Doane began a career with Sanborn Map Co., in Pelham, N.Y., where he worked for 47 years, beginning as a mapmaker and retiring as president of the company.

In the mid-1960s, he appeared on the television show "To Tell the Truth," jokingly referred to as a streetwalker because of the extensive walking his job required in making maps all over the country. Doane pioneered an innovation in mapmaking, the "buying power map," which showed in various colors the economic demographics of different areas so advertisers could target their marketing dollars more efficiently. An enthusiastic golfer, he was a former member of Siwanoy Country Club in Bronxville, a former member of Southern Seniors, and the oldest member of the Landings Golf Club, where he played until a year ago. Over the years, he had five holes-in-one, the last two in his 70s and 80s. He loved hunting and fishing in his earlier years, was a talented artist who worked in watercolors and pastels, and enjoyed telling stories about growing up on the Cape. An avid sports fan, he never gave up hope the Red Sox would win another World Series. He was a member of the Kiwanis Club in Fort Myers, and delivered Meals on Wheels well into his 90s.

Doane is survived by a daughter-in-law, Evelyn Doane of Chatham; two stepchildren, Judy McNaughton and John Walker of Canada; two grandchildren; a great-grandson; and seven step-grandchildren. He was also the father of the late David Robertson Doane. Burial services were private. Memorial donations may be made to St. Christopher's Church, Main Street, Chatham, MA 02633.

Nancy W. Doane Estate Benefits Doane College

Doane College, Crete, Neb., received \$443,170 from the estate of Nancy W. Doane, Ph.D., Sun City, Ariz.,

who died June 7, 2001. A member of the Doan(e) Family Association of America, she was also

a longtime supporter of the college.

One-third of Doane's estate was designated for the college's Zenon C.R. Hansen Leadership Program, and the remaining two-thirds established an endowed fund to support faculty salaries. Previous monetary gifts were earmarked for the college's annual Doane Fund and toward construction costs of the Lied Science and Mathematics Building.

Doane, born in Galena, Kan., in 1914, was the daughter of Jess and Martha Walthall. She had two brothers, Jess and Neal, and a sister, Margorie.

Doane held bachelor's and master's degrees in education from Kansas State College, Pittsburg, and a

doctoral degree in philosophy from Northwestern University, Chicago. She taught elementary school in Valley Falls, Kan., and Joplin, Mo. Doane

taught English literature at Monticello College, Alton, Ill., then was a college administrator

at Beloit College, Beloit, Wis.

Doane was a member of Eastern Star, PEO, and Phi Beta Kappa honorary academic fraternity. She was a member of Faith Presbyterian Chapel, Sun City.

In 1955, Doane married D.
Howard Doane, founder of Doane
Agricultural Service in St. Louis. He also
founded the national Farmhouse fraternity
and served as Under Secretary of Agriculture
during the Herbert Hoover administration.

A memorial service was held for Doane, June 13 at Faith Presbyterian Chapel. Her ashes were spread on her husband's grave at Mt. Hope Cemetery, Joplin, Mo.

Le May Doan Golden Again

- Canadian wins her second straight Olympic 500-meter speedskating title

Canada's Catriona Le May Doan won her second straight Olympic 500-meter speedskating title on Thursday night, putting her within one gold medal of matching Bonnie Blair.

Le May Doan has no plans to pursue Blair's record, saying she'll likely retire after next season.

"This is over and above anything I ever dreamed of," the 31-year-old Canadian said. "You get to the point where you want to do other things."

Le May Doan crossed the line in 37.45 seconds, giving her an aggregate time in the two-day event of 1:14.75 seconds.

She easily defeated a pair of Germans. Monique Garbrecht-Enfeldt (1:14.94) won silver and Sabine Volker (1:15.19) took the bronze.

Le May Doan becomes just the second woman to win two straight 500s. Blair won three in a row in 1988, '92, and '94.

Surprisingly, Le May Doan failed to break her own world record of 37.22, even though she finished on the more favorable outer lane. She did leave with a pair of Olympic records: 37.30, set Wednesday, and a two-day total that eclipsed her mark of 1:16.60 from four years ago.

This was the second straight event in which the previous world record stood up. So much for those predictions that all 10 marks would fall on the fast ice of the Utah Olympic Oval.

Le May Doan was an overwhelming favorite in the 500. She arrived at Salt Lake City having won 18 of her last 19 races, including all six World Cup events this year.

Garbrecht-Enfeldt, skating in the final pair with Le May Doan, clinched second place with a run of 37.60. She picked up her second Olympic medal 10 years after the first, having took bronze in the 1,000 at Albertville. She finally claimed a 500 medal after finishing sixth in 1994 and eighth four years ago.

Volker earned her first Olympic medal and will be one of the top contenders in the 1,000, along with Le May Doan.

Le May Doan took a victory lap lugging a red-and-white Canadian flag, with a small banner attached to it representing her home province of Saskatchewan. On the backstretch, husband Bart Doan – rodeo cowboy and icemaker at the Calgary Olympic Oval – gave her his cowboy hat.

The top two finishers from the first day held their position, but Andrea Nuyt of the Netherlands dropped from third to fourth after a slight slip on the final turn, causing her left hand to scrape the ice.

Volker moved up from fifth to third, beating Nuyt by 0.18 seconds. The Americans were not a factor. Chris Witty, still weak after a bout with mononucleosis, was 14th out of 31 skaters with a time of 1:16.73. The 500 is not her best event, but she wanted to use it as a warmup for Sunday's 1,000.

Doane College Home to Naval Anchor

Doane College, Crete, Neb., became home to a ship's anchor in March. It came from a naval shipyard in Beaumont, Texas. The anchor is the focal point of Leadership Plaza, designed to commemorate the Navy V-12/V-5 officertraining program that was quartered at the college during World War II. More than 700 men went through officer training. The plaza also contains four flagpoles and a plaque describing the history of the college's V-12/V-5 program. The Plaza is located southeast of Hansen Hall, and is part of the landscape for a new east entrance to campus. A formal dedication of Leadership Plaza will take place in May.
