President's Message



The group voted not to cut the tour short, so arrived back on campus in time for the later afternoon presentations. The first General Membership meeting was

presided over by President Dick Doane. President Dick announced that this reunion was being dedicated to the memory of our dear friend and Regional Vice President Wayne "Jim" Doane (FL) who was the Reunion chairman, but passed away on June 24, 2004. A moment of silence was held in his memory and for his family.


Our memorial service, acknowledging those members who have died the past two years, was led by Mary Doane (AZ), with the assistance of Past Presidents Bill Doan (KY), Albert Doane (OH) and Dorothy Doan Baker (NY). Denison University President Dr. Dale Knoble welcomed the Doan(e)s to campus and talked at length about the history of the University and the role played by William Howard Doane in campus development. President Dick presented Dr. Knoble with a check for \$500 from the Doane Family Foundation to be placed in their Memorial Scholarship Fund. Then, Dr. Fred Brown, President of Doane College, made a surprise visit and addressed the members - extolling the College and inviting our family to return to Nebraska at our earliest convenience. Dr. Brown also announced that he would be retiring from Doane College in the summer of 2005. Janet Jeffries also reported on the latest news from Doane College, including DFA finances. Following the meeting, presentations were given by Janice Doan (KY) on William Howard Doane's

daughter Marguerite Treat Doane and by Derek Done (UK) on Deacon John Doane Research Status. That evening we were treated to a lovely reception at the University's William Howard Doane Library. After a tour of the library, local musicians entertained us as we enjoyed our punch and dessert.

Wednesday, August 4

Arising bright and early, 50 of our members boarded a bus for our Cincinnati tour—a two hour trip. The Cincinnati Museum of History, housed in the historic Union Terminal train station was the first stop. This museum gave everyone a fine overview of the development of Cincinnati and the area. The tour was followed by an IMAX theatre presentation of "Australia." It then proceeded to rain, so box lunches were served and eaten there. Our second stop was at the Cincinnati Art Museum which houses a vast collection of rare musical instruments donated by William Howard Doane. The final stop was at "Sunnyside", the 19th century mansion, home to WHD and his family from 1879 until 1920. Due to the inclement weather, we were unable to stop at WHD's grave site in Spring Grove Cemetery.

The day's other side tours included trips to the Columbus Zoo, Ohio Historical Center, Heisey Glass Museum, Longaberger Basket Company, National Road Museum and Zane Grey Museum.

Again, an early morning bus was boarded by about 50 travelers for a tour of the Amish country-side. A knowledgeable local guide explained the history and lifestyle of the "Plain" people. We were treated to a wonderful family style dinner on a farm and shopped at Amish bakeries and markets. Some even took buggy rides. Then came our third "glitch" of the week-the Amish tour bus was over an hour late returning, and dinner was missed by these weary travelers. Thankfully, the Denison cafeteria boxed up the meal, and transported it to the dormitory for those on the bus to enjoy.

Our evening program had a late start, but no one complained. We were blessed with a cool evening to enjoy the wonderful acoustics and architecture of the Swasey Chapel, a beautiful early 1900s structure. Eunice Brabec (CA) began the talent show with her presentation "A Stitch in Time." This was followed by a variety of acts featuring many family members. The highlight of the evening was the finale —a William Howard Doane hymn sing. The chapel was rocking as the family sang many of WHD's most popular hymns, accompanied by Teddie Westlake, a Denison alumnus. What an awesome experience to stand on the stage and listen to over 100 Doanes stand and sing the final hymn, "To God be the Glory." (This hymn sing will definitely happen again at future reunions.)

Friday, August 6

The final General Meeting session was held today. President Dick presented a new Chapter Charter to Washington - Oregon - Idaho Chapter. Cora Brodie (ONT) presented a plaque to President Dick from the Doane House in Ontario for the DFA contribution made two years ago. Two "lap robes" donated by Mary Belle Lontz (PA) were won by Ethridge Doane III (NI) and Virgil Doan (UT). The members voted to accept the proposal for the 2006 reunion to be held in Northern California or N.W. Nevada. In a lighter moment, Chaplain Ray Doane presented President Dick with a Purple Heart for his "heroic deeds."

The Friday evening festivities began with wine and hors d'oeuvre in the Curtis West Party Room. Then our annual picture taking took place. Everyone was decked out in their finest array.

A tasty dinner of prime rib and chicken was served buffet style. After dinner, President Dick introduced new officers and directors. He then presented plaques of appreciation to the officers and directors who had contributed immensely to the Association

over 10 years or more: Secretary Mary Ann Sindt (MI), VP Albert Doane (OH), VP Sylvia Doane LaVigne (MA) and 1st VP Erma Phillips (CA). A plaque was also sent to Pat Sullivan (OK) for her dedication to the family as Regional Vice President.

Historian Kay Blair (VA), Virgil Doan (UT), and Albert Doane (OH) provided a moment of levity, while expressing the heartfelt sentiments of the members, by presenting a "Wounded in Action" plaque and "Purple Heart" to our President Dick for "being attacked by table while leading DFA into action".

Family members contributed a gratuity of more than \$350 to the students who helped us get around campus in the extended golf carts and took us on some of the tours. We were pleased that several members of the Denison staff were able to join us for this evening's festivities. The evening closed with another tribute to our deceased Vice President Wayne "Jim" Doane.

Saturday, August 7

Well, the week has ended and everyone is packing for home or other vacation destinations. Most everyone turned in their evaluations of the reunion and those will be studied as we plan for upcoming reunions. Thanks to all who participated. We think everyone had a great time at Denison University and would consider returning there again.

Regional Vice President Wayne "Jim" Doane 1937-2004

Wayne Allen "Jim" Doane, 66, of St. Petersburg, FL, formerly of Cambridge, OH, died Thursday, June 24, 2004, at St. Anthony's Hospital, St. Petersburg, FL.

He was born Sept. 14, 1937, in Lebanon, OH, son of the late Walter and Myrtle (Kilpatrick) Doane.

Mr. Doane was a graduate of the University of Maryland. He was in the Air Force, a senior executive for the Department of Defense, and a member of the Power Squadron, St. Pete Yacht Club. He loved woodworking, biking and sailing. He was Methodist by faith.

He leaves his wife, Judith Faye Doane of St. Petersburg, whom he married May 30, 1956; a daughter, Debbie Zillig of St. Petersburg; two sons, Darrell Doane of Memphis, Tenn., and Dennis Doane of Sarasota, Fla.; and eight grandchildren.

Olympian Phil Doane Trinter Competes in Athens

Phil Doane Trinter of Lorain, Ohio represented the United States in the Olympic Sailing competition in Athens this past summer. His mother, Diane Doane Trinter, sends us the following account of their experience:

Hello Everybody,

My name is Diane Doane Trinter, and I just came home from one of the most extraordinary adventures of my life. I attended the 28th Olympiad in Athens, Greece to watch my son participate in these games. He and his skipper, Paul Cayard, raced in the sailing venue in the Star Class sailboat. It is a two-man, keel class, about 22 feet long, and two sails – a jib, and a mainsail. There were eleven races, and although they did not bring home a medal, they were in the hunt until the last race. The winds were against them and they ended up in 5th place out of 17 competitors.

My new daughter-in-law, Chrissy, and I went out to watch every race on a 250 ft observation boat, (three decks), to cheer our team. The former Chrissy Idiart, competed in college as a member of the lightweight four – the first Fordham University rowing team to win a national championship in a course record that still stands today, and was just inducted into their Sports Hall of Fame.

On board our ship, we were served bread, salad, pasta, rice, meat, potatoes, and dessert by uniformed waiters every day. There was also a bar where you could get any liquid refreshment that you wanted. Water, for me, as it was hot, hot, hot. Although the ship was air-conditioned you could get out of the sun easily enough. This was a dry heat, not the humidity we have around Lake Erie.


We live in Lorain, Ohio, right on Lake Erie, where Phil, at the age of eight, started his sailing destiny. He did get sidetracked by playing football on a full scholarship at Indiana University in Bloomington, IN, and lettered all four years, weighing in at 300 lbs, 6 ft. 6 in. He is now at 220 sailing weight.

Phil has been the winning crew in two North American championships, he is a Gold Star World Champion, he has competed in two America's cups, the list goes on, and finally the highest honor any sailor can achieve, representing your country in the Olympics.

Phil's father, a World Ward II Navy veteran who died in 1996, taught him how to skipper a power boat. That's right, I'm the sailor and it was a nice combination. Phil, also, is backed by a loving family of one brother and three sisters. He has now added his wife's family as strong supporters.

Greece is a beautiful and historic country. We felt so comfortable and "at home" as most everybody speaks English. We shopped and did some sight seeing when able, and went out to dinner every night, and then to the Internet Café to use one of the many computers to catch up on email We did not stay in Athens, but the Glyfada, and city/suburb of Athens.

U.S. Sailing, the prime source of finances for sailors, took all eighteen American Sailors and any family member present and support staff out to dinner at a restaurant on the shores of the Mediterranean Sea. It was lovely. The minutes of the last reunion and Treasurer's report were published in Doane News and sent to all members before the reunion.


