PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

special thanks to all those involved. Attendees came from Nova Scotia to British Columbia, from Washington to Florida and from Arizona to New Hampshire. The *Proceedings* will fill you in on

everything that transpired.

I am quite pleased to announce that the Board of Directors approved my proposal to establish another Scholarship Fund. This new program, named the Doane Family Scholarship Fund, will be funded by a minimum of \$10,000 annually from our DFA Endowment Funds, and could be more than that if our annual investment income exceeds that figure. The initial endowment will be over \$17,000. This new program will enable us to provide more scholastic assistance to members, and their families, who do not attend Doane College – and enables us to also assist members in Canada. The Doane Family Foundation is being re-structured as this goes to press, and will be up and running before the end of

the year. We encourage our members, and their children/grandchildren, to apply for assistance. An application is enclosed in this newsletter for the 2009/2010 scholastic year.

We are also looking for a new Logo for our Association that can be used on our letterheads, on our web site, and other publications. Look for our new contest in this newsletter.

We are really anxious to get Volume III published for our members, but we are still quite a ways away from completing the preparation. If any member is able to help Kay Blair and Virgil Doan with typing these manuscripts, please contact Kay. Her e-mail and phone number are listed in this newsletter. We would like to get this to our publisher in 2010. Thank you.

We did establish some strict guidelines for publishing our Fall and Spring Newsletters, and hopefully you will be receiving them on a timely basis in the future.

We continue to look for Done/Donnes in the UK to participate in our DNA Project. We still do not have a match for Deacon John Doane's descendents here in the US. We will continue to pursue this in every way possible.

After the reunion concluded in Barrie, Ontario, Canada this year my family (wife Wilma and daughter Debra) stayed five days in Niagara Falls, Canada. The Falls were just breathtaking and at night the lights on the Falls gave us a different perspective as did the fireworks display.

Peter Doan, of St. Catharines, spent two days touring us around the greater Niagara region. He took us to Doans Ridge (located of course on Doans Ridge Road) where the Seven Brothers of Crowland homesteaded. We also visited Doans Ridge Cemetery and the Pellham Meeting House Cemetery.

Titus Doan (#93) is buried at the Pellham Meeting House Cemetery, additionally we found many makers for various Doans at the Doans Ridge Cemetery. Those who were of interest to this writer were, Titus Doan (#93), Willson Doan (#595), his wife and several of their children. We were excited to read the grave

stone of Helen Doan, because the stone reads, "Wife of Norman Doan" and gives her date of death. We have always thought that this Helen was Norman's first wife, and now we have the proof. Helen only lived for 2 years and 1 month after they were married. Shortly after this event Norman moved to Ogle County, Illinois, USA. (Norman Doan (T-28.1) was this writer's great-grandfather).

We had an interesting thing happen while we were at the Doans Ridge Cemetery. We were all looking at different grave stones and Peter struck up a conversation with a couple of folks that were near us and it turned out that they were visiting the grave of the Malcolm McIntyre and Hulda McIntyre. That means that they are related because Hulda McIntyre was the daughter of Solomon Doan (T-11.1). (Solomon is the great-great-grandfather of this writer).

This just goes to prove that whenever you attend a Doane Family Association of America reunion you might find more exciting things than you expected.



Lauderdale, FL, on Saturday, January 31, 2009. He plans a full day at the main university library, with talks and demonstrations by himself and his colleagues on genealogical research databases, genetics, the relationship between genetic and genealogical study and particularly the ongoing Doane Family y-DNA research project. The university is located off I-595 about eight miles from the Ft. Lauderdale International Airport: http://www.nova.edu/cwis/campusmaps/maincampus.html Since February is the height of the tourist season in South Florida, with temperatures in the 80s, be sure to book hotel rooms early. Comfort Suites (2540 Davie Rd.) will offer us a rate of \$189.00 a night plus tax (for a double) as long as ten rooms are booked by October 31, 2008 (this is actually a pretty competitive rate for the area). The hotel, located near NSU, has a free shuttle service from the airport and will also provide a free shuttle to the university on the morning of the meeting (car rides can be provided for the afternoon return, if necessary). New England Chapter Message

Congratulations to Cora Brodie and all those who worked to make the 50th anniversary DFA reunion in Barrie, Ontario a success. It was my first experience attending a DFA reunion at a hotel site. I think it worked well. It was great to get re-acquainted with DFA reunion regulars such as Dorothy Doan Baker of New York, Barbara Doane of New Jersey, Albert Doane of Ohio, and Derek Done of England. I was also happy to meet Craige Rogers and his family. Craige is the President of the new Central New York Chapter. I enjoyed all the time spent with the retired geologists Bob and Bill Williams, one from Texas the other from California. We all got to hear James E. Doan of Florida give his presentation on a possible connection with the Welsh Dwnn Family of Kidwelly. It was entertaining seeing Don Brodie having so much fun with the raffle. I was very impressed with the Sharon Temple built by Ebenezer Doan. This was part of the Doan Homestead tour. I thank you Ontario for making this reunion a wonderful time.

After the reunion in Barrie my wife, Elizabeth Perry, and I continued to investigate possible venues for the 2012 DFA Reunion. Earlier in the summer we had spent a day in Plymouth looking at accommodations near the center of town. Among the places that we visited were the John Carver Inn and the Radisson Hotel at Plymouth Harbor. The DFA reunion has been held at Plymouth, MA a number of times in the distant past. It has a number of attractions close by including Plimouth Plantation. We decided that the John Carver wasn't large enough to handle the numbers that we expect to attend the reunion in 2012. The Radisson was really the only facility in the area that could accommodate our numbers. The Radisson is opposite Plymouth Harbor. It has 175 guest rooms and a restaurant and pub on site. The hotel is within walking distance of the Mayflower II, Plymouth Rock, whale watching and harbor cruises. There is a ferry in Plymouth that goes to Provincetown.

In August, fresh from the reunion at Barrie, we made a trip to Hyannis on Cape Cod. We visited two facilities that we thought could host the DFA reunion in four years. The first was the Cape Codder Resort and Spa located off Route 132 in Hyannis. The Cape Codder is owned and operated by the Catania Hospitality Group. The facility has 257 rooms, 15 acres of lawns, gardens, and an area with clambake and bonfire pits. Two restaurants are on site. There are 16,000 square feet of function space. The facility also has an exclusive indoor wave pool with 50 and 80 foot water slides. We were most impressed with this facility. On the down-side is that it isn't within walking distance of Hyannis Center.

The second facility we visited was the Resort and Conference Center at Hyannis. This resort has 52 acres that includes an 18 hole, 3 par golf course. There are 232 guestrooms at this facility with 15 meeting rooms with a total of 30,000 square feet of function space. Outside there is a cabana tent for functions for up to 150 people. It is within walking distance of Hyannis Center shops, attractions, and the historic waterfront district. The Barnstable Municipal Airport is about one mile away.

In October we intend to visit facilities in Falmouth, Dennis, and the Four Points Sheraton in Eastham. The plan is then to narrow the decision to two facilities and have the reunion committee members visit the two sites with us to make a final decision. We would like to complete this process by the end of 2009.

DOANE FAMILY FOUNDATION SCHOLARSHIPS

In conjunction with Doane College, the Doane Family Foundation has established guidelines and an application for Doane Family Association members to apply for college assistance. The guidelines state that a DFA member's child, or grandchild, will not necessarily receive priority assistance. Also, you need to know that your applicant does not have to attend Doane College to receive assistance. Funding of these scholarships by the Doane Family Foundation have in the past several years ranged from \$500 per year to \$5,000 per year. Average assistance has been in the range of \$1,500 per year. Assistance is usually given to four or five students per year. We hope to increase our scholarship fund this year, which will enable us to increase our funding in the future. Please feel free to contact Dick Doane if you have any questions regarding the process.

THE PROCESS:

<u>January 30</u> - Applicants submit the completed Doane Family Scholarship application and a copy of the current year's processed FAFSA results to the Doane Family scholarship organization.

<u>February 15</u> - Doane Family scholarship organization meets to review all scholarship applications and select potential recipients.

<u>February 25</u> - Doane Family scholarship organization submits to Doane College for consideration name(s) and recommended scholarship amount(s). Note: the final scholarship amount will be determined after May 1.

May 15 - Doane College informs the Doane Family scholarship organization of its recipients (and financial aid awards), confirms with the recipient(s) their college choice, and requests copy of the recipient's final award notification.

<u>July / August</u> - Check is cut by Doane College, made co-payable to the student and the college, upon receipt of a final award notification.


Hezekiah Doane Sighting!

This summer Ralph and I visited the Old Harbor Life Saving Station at Race Point in Provincetown. Our purpose was to see a re-enactment of the 1902 beach apparatus rescue drill by the keeper and surfmen The actors were all staff and volunteers for the U.S. National Park Service. Imagine our surprise when the Keeper (leader) was introduced to us as Hezekiah Doane! The uniformed Surfmen used a cannon to fire a line to a ship in distress and then hauled the victims to shore. The eastern shore of Cape Cod is an extremely dangerous place to sail due to shifting shoals. Over 3000 ships were lost in this area. The U.S. Life Saving Service was in operation in the late 19th and early 20th century, until it was replaced by the U.S. Coast Guard.

The Jamaica Plain Tuesday Club recently acquired at auction two early 19th-century portraits of former Loring-Greenough House residents. The portraits hung in the house for 100 years but have most recently been in California. Tuesday Club member and Interim Board member Ed Stanley tells the story:

was researching a portrait by Chester Harding for an appraisal client and came across information on the Web that a pair of portraits by Harding were soon to be "crossing the block" at Skinner here in Boston: Those of David Stoddard Greenough II (1787–1830) and his wife, Maria Foster Doane Greenough (1793–1843). I immediately knew that this husband and wife had to be of the same family that owned the Loring-Greenough House.

Chester Harding (1792–1866) was a well-known society portrait painter in Boston, and he painted many prominent people and politicians of the day. He was primarily active ca. 1826–46, and he maintained a studio in Boston for many years. The Greenough portraits are attributed to Chester Harding and are listed in his catalogue of known works.

David Stoddard Greenough II was born in 1787, his father and mother, David Stoddard Greenough and Anne Doane Greenough had moved into the House in 1784. David II was educated at Harvard and in 1813 married Maria Foster Doane of Cohasset, a distant relative of his mother. His business acumen was terrible, and his personal bankruptcy in 1819 cast a pall over the rest of his life. Insolvent, he moved his family from their Boston residence into his father's Jamaica Plain home. Although he maintained a small law practice there, he primarily devoted himself to agricultural pursuits on the family farm. He finally settled his debts after his father's death in 1826, and he died shortly thereafter, in 1830.

Maria Foster Doane Greenough inherited property that included the Jamaica Plain manse under her widow's dower. In 1836, she married General William Hyslop Sumner, a prominent Boston developer. Sumner, along with David and Maria's children, was responsible for subdividing and developing the Greenough farmland, an area now known as Sumner Hill. The portrait of Maria was likely completed during her marriage to General Sumner. She died in 1843.

The Tuesday Club already owned a pair of oil-on-panel portraits of David and Maria that were painted for their daughter, Anna Greenough Burgwyn, who had moved to North Carolina. The recently acquired portrait of Maria was likely painted from life and shows a woman of about 40 years of age. The portrait of David was painted posthumously at the same time, likely from a lost original work. These two portraits were probably intended for one of David and Maria's children.

The two paintings have traveled a bit in the last 80 or so years. They hung in the Loring-Greenough House until the home was sold by the Greenough family in 1924. At that point, they were taken to Medfield, where the Greenough family had a large farm. There the paintings stayed until the 1960s, when the farm was sold and the household possessions dispersed. Family member Hamilton Perkins Greenough moved the pieces to his home in Santa Barbara, California. He took good care of the portraits, cleaning, relining, and inscribing them in 1979. After his death in 1984, the portraits were sold. In 2007, the paintings surfaced at Christie's auction house in New York City, where they did not self. The owner then decided to try his luck at selling them in Boston at Skinner, Inc. The Tuesday Club purchased them there on February 17.

Long-time Tuesday Club member and past House Management Committee Chair, Katharine Cipolla and I sought Interim Board approval to raise funds to purchase the portraits. We then contacted people who would be interested in seeing the paintings return to the house. Within about one week, we received pledges from a variety of people, including Greenough family members, Tuesday Club members, the Jamaica Plain community, and others.
