




DFA REUNION 2022 NEWS!!!!

Amtrak also comes through several times per week. We are so used to train traffic here, that we almost don't hear them anymore, and when we do it's comforting. The regular trains are a sign of vigorous commerce, and reflects a strong connection to our Doane University history. The trains can be heard all over town and at the university.

Pandemic Parallels With My Doane Relative

The first time I applied for the Doane Family Foundation scholarship, I was a rising college freshman, eager and excited for my first year at James Madison University. I planned to pursue a double major in Theatre and Communications. College was a fresh start. I was so excited to make new friends, be on my own, and thrive in a university I already had so much connection to. The first few months of college were

everything I had hoped for and more.

COVID-19 took over in mid-March which completely uprooted the normalcy I had just gotten used to and the incredible new experiences I was having. For almost a year, I've been taking all of my college courses online which has been more frustrating and challenging than I thought it ever could be. Like most people, March of 2020 began some of the most difficult months of my life. My college years were (and still are) being taken away from me due to a phenomenon I absolutely have no control over. In the midst of that chaos of my life, I decided a theatre degree was not what I wanted to do with my life. I dropped Theatre completely to pursue a Communications major with a double minor in Entrepreneurship and Studio Arts, in the hopes of becoming an interior designer.

I am not one to adapt to change easily or enjoy change, so completely turning my college path in a different direction alongside the uprooted normalcy challenged me immensely this past year. I am looking forward to the hopeful future and that JMU will soon be able to return to

how it should be. I think about how my future self will look back to all of these "unprecedented times." I can already imagine the stories I'll tell my children and grandchildren, the same way my grandma tells me stories that her mother, Emily Doane Meitzke, told her about living through the 1918 influenza pandemic.

My great grandmother Emily Doane Meitzke passed away at age 94 in 2002, when I was just a year and a half old. But my Grandma Jane, a member of the Doane Family Association, has told me so much that great grandmother Emily told her about the 1918 pandemic when she was nine years old. No one in Emily's family ever passed from influenza, but they had to wear masks when going downtown. School was delayed for three months, and she had to attend study sessions on Saturdays to make up for the lost school time. Emily watched the Red Cross carry

the victims of influenza past her house every day. 600,000 people died of influenza in the United States and it lasted two years, the second year being the worst.

A hundred years later, I'm living a very different, yet quite similar, life that my greatgrandmother did. Though I feel overwhelmed and challenged with this new normal, knowing that my great grandmother knew life past her pandemic gives me hope and comfort that I will know life past mine.

First train arrived in Crete 150 years ago!

On June 12, 1871 the first passenger trains came to Crete from Lincoln for inaugural runs! Crete had just become the western terminus of Thomas Doane's line from its starting point at Plattsmouth on the Missouri River. Dignitaries, including Colonel Doane, from the Burlington Missouri River Railroad, Lincoln and Crete leaders, and several members of the Congregational Church Association were on board the two runs, morning and afternoon. The Doane Academy had just been incorporated on May 22, and representatives from the Congregational Church Association, who came



on the excursion train actually laid cornerstone the for the building before boarding the train to go back Lincoln. The academy building was completed later that year, setting the



stage for Doane College incorporated in 1872. Students went to the academy (high school level) to prep for their

college studies.

The June 16, 1871 headline in the one-month-old Saline County Post newspaper acknowledged "The New Era," and noted that it was a memorable day for Crete, as the town itself just incorporated in March, was now connected to the outside world. The short article ended with the lines: "Rapid is the march of empire Westward. From this time forward, Crete is to be known as a place easily accessible, beautiful for its situation, inviting to settler, full of promise for the future."

THE PURPLE HEART

In February, 2021, I received an email through Finda-Grave from a man named Danny Screws. He wasn't sure how he came by it, but he was in the possession of a Purple Heart that was awarded to a soldier named Howard H. Doan. Danny had had the Purple Heart in a box for years. One day he decided to take it out of the box, and then discovered that there was a name inscribed on the back! He wanted some assistance from me to see if I could find to whom the Purple Heart belonged, and to see if I might be able to locate any family members. I didn't have much to go on so I was unsure If there might be any living family members. I was able to find a Howard Doan, who died in 1945, listed in Finda-Grave. I researched a little bit and realized that he had died in combat during World War II. There were no family links on the memorial, only a photo of Howard's gravestone. I was pretty sure this was the right guy.

First, since Danny had sent me two photos of the Purple Heart, I posted those to Howard's Find-a-Grave page. I then sent an email to the manager of the Finda-grave page to see if he might be related to Howard. I explained that I was trying to find a family member who might be interested in receiving Howard's Purple Heart. Alas, he was not related to Howard. I requested that ownership of Howard's memorial be transferred to me, and the manager kindly transferred the memorial to me. Next, I added a comment on the memorial about trying to find someone related to Howard, and asked to be contacted. No luck.



I did some digging on Ancestry.com and came across a man who seemed to have a family tree connected to Howard, someone named Marcus Doan. On February 6, 2021, I sent Marcus a message through Ancestry.com asking to be notified if he were related to Pvt. Howard H. Doan. I didn't get a response right away and figured I had hit a dead end.

This was not the case! On March 29, 2021, I received an email response from Marcus. He apologized for not

responding earlier, but he hadn't checked his Ancestry. com account for a while, and didn't realize that I had sent him a message. Marcus stated that Howard, who died in 1945, was his uncle! This was great news! I eagerly replied to Marcus's message to see if he might be interested in receiving the Purple Heart. It was not too much of a surprise when he responded, "Absolutely!" He said that he had four Doan uncles who served in World War II--two who were killed in action and two who were wounded. He had been trying to locate any service memorabilia for the uncles. Coincidentally, Marcus said that his family was planning a family reunion for April 24th—and wouldn't it be great to share the Purple Heart with everyone?

We emailed back and forth. Marcus asked me to send his contact information in an email to Danny. After receiving Marcus's email, Danny called Marcus. They found out that they only lived a couple of hours from each other in Texas! They arranged to meet in Danny's hometown of Bremond, TX, on Saturday, April 3. They had a photo taken of the two of them with the Purple Heart. A local newspaper wanted to write a story about them!

That night, Marcus called me and talked for 45 minutes. It was an emotional experience for him to be given his uncle's Purple Heart after all these years. Marcus shared that his uncle was one of ten children. Out of those ten children, there are only two living aunts, Joyce Conley and Doris Coleman. Marcus said that Howard was married briefly the marriage ended when Howard was killed in action. Marcus and Danny think that they may be distantly related through Marcus's mother's side. Somehow, Danny came into possession of Howard's Danny couldn't Purple Heart. remember, but thought he might have gotten it from a yard sale, or possibly from his father or uncle! Marcus does not know what happened to the other uncle's Purple Heart, but he would like to have it returned to the family as well.

Marcus invited Danny, John and me to his family reunion on April 24th. The reunion was to be held 2-3 hours north of Houston in Trinity, Texas. This would be a long drive for us. John had a prior commitment the night before as he was co-hosting an annual meeting of the Friends of the Plains, something he couldn't forego. That meant we would have had to have driven all night to be able to get to the reunion by 11:00 AM. We decided it was not feasible to attend the reunion, which was very disappointing. Danny, too had a prior family commitment and was unable to attend the reunion.

On, April 24, 2021, the annual family reunion was held. In the presence of the family, Howard's Purple Heart was returned to his two surviving siblings, Joyce Conley and Doris Coleman, by two of only 4 remaining Doan boys in this branch of the family, both of whom are military veterans: Larry Doan, the son of Mildridge C. Doan, and Marcus Doan, the son of Rev. Nelson E. Doan. He had managed to keep this presentation a secret until then! Marcus reported that about 50 people attended the reunion. Afterward, Marcus sent me a photo of him presenting the Purple Heart to his two aunts. This

was an emotional experience for all of them.

Marcus was curious about his family's lineage and connection to my husband John. He wondered about the Doane/Doan thing—don't we all?! I was able to type up a little chart (I hope it is correct!) showing the generations backward to Deacon John Doane. It shows that John and Marcus's father, Rev. Nelson Doan, were 8th cousins; John's children and Marcus are 9th cousins; and John's grandchildren

and Marcus's children are 10th cousins. I don't know that I ever came up with a good explanation for anyone dropping the "e" from Doan. Marcus's aunt reported having been told that Deacon Doane brought two nephews with him to Massachusetts! I have never heard that before—maybe someone else knows something about it? Maybe this could be a new line of research. If it is true, were they Doanes, or were they nephews by marriage?!

Marcus shared some of his background with me for this story. Marcus "Marc" Dwayne Doan was born in Crockett, Houston County, Texas (East Texas) in 1965, the son of Rev. Nelson Eugene Doan (deceased) and Sarah A. Coon Doan (Tina). He has two siblings, Charlotte Ann Doan Birdwell, Marthaville, Louisiana, and Rev. Nelson Eugene Doan II (deceased). He and his two sons--Heath Logan Doan, born in San Antonio, Texas, in 2004, and Blaine Marshall Doan, born San Antonio, Texas, in 2007--currently reside in Converse, Bexar County, Texas (a San Antonio Suburb). When Marcus was 16, he enlisted U.S. Army. He reported for duty only two weeks after graduation from high school in 1983 at the age of 17. Marcus was assigned to Co. C 3/73 Armor (Airborne) 82nd Airborne Division. Regarding his vocation, Marcus is a 32-year veteran police officer. He has been a Police Sergeant since 1998. Additionally, he has served as a Municipal, College and School District Police Officer.

There were four uncles, all deceased, who served in WWII:

Harold "Bud" Doan – U.S. Navy Seabees

Mildridge "Mill" Doan – U.S. Army Air Corps

Hayne Doan – U.S. Army 165th Infantry Regiment 27th Infantry Division – Deceased Okinawa April 29, 1945

Howard "Jr." Doan – U.S Army 274th Infantry Regiment 70th Infantry Division – Deceased France Feb. 22, 1945.

Prior to the reunion, I talked to Marcus about joining the Doane Family Association, and I sent membership information to him hoping people at the reunion would like to join our group. Since the reunion, Marcus. his two sons and his sister have joined our ranks. I

have claimed them for the Great Plains Chapter. If they really belong in another chapter, someone may have to fight me for them! I am hoping they will be able to find out more information about their ancestors as well as their present-day connections. I mentioned to him that there is a current DNA study through Family Tree DNA

in case he and his family members might be interested in taking DNA tests.

In appreciation, Marcus sent me a Challenge Coin and a ribbon for Howard's unit. I was really surprised by this, and it makes me feel connected to Howard, and to Marcus and his Doans, even though—technically—I am only a Doan by marriage.

This whole experience is one of my highlights from using Find-a-Grave and working on genealogy. I get several requests a week for assistance with researching families, many of them for Doan or Doane lines. It is really fun to put the puzzle pieces together, and this was one of the neatest things yet. And it's not just interesting—this story was powerful, emotional, and meaningful to someone. In Memory - Albert C. Doane, Ohio

The Doane Family Association lost a longtime active member on June 4, 2021. Albert C. Doane (#1519, Vol. 2) age 96, a past DFA president, board member, and chairman of the DFA archives committee, was born February 2, 1925, in Lorain, Ohio to Carlin M. and Olive H. Pancoast Doane, (#1204, Vol.2). Albert graduated from Lorain High School in 1943, and served in the United States Navy on the USS Wichita in the Pacific during World War II. He later graduated from Ohio University with a degree in Electrical Engineering.

Albert was married to Patricia Ann Blank on June 15, 1949. Al, as he was known to his friends, and Patsy were regulars at DFA reunions. Albert and Patsy had four children, six grandchildren, and nine great grandchildren. Patsy died on September 8, 2000.

Albert joined the family's CM Doane Electric Company in the 1950s, and eventually became part owner and president. He retired in 1984, and began a life of travel, research, and writing as the family historian/genealogist. He also dedicated much time to the preservation of Lorain's history and historic sites. He prepared and delivered numerous presentations on

local topics, including the Lakeshore Electric Interurban street cars and the 1924 Lorain tornado. He was the author or co-author of several books of local history, and was a founder of, and dedicated volunteer at the Black River Historical Society.

Albert was a longtime member of the First United Methodist Church in Lorain, and then joined the Cornerstone United Methodist in Elyria, where he held leadership roles. He was a Mason for over 70 years, and a dedicated Kiwanis member.

On September 2, 2006, Albert married Bernadine (Theobald) Wagner, "Bernie" who also took part in all DFA activities. The couple met via local history activities. With this union, Al became step-father, step-grandfather, and step great-grandfather to Bernie's offspring.

Our DFA mascot "Little Albert" is named after this Albert, and over the years, much fun was had over this "relationship." "Big" Albert will be greatly missed by all DFA members who knew him.

Albert was preceded in death by his parents, three brothers and one granddaughter. Services were held Wednesday, June 9, 2021 at the Cornerstone United Methodist Church in Elyria.

English Muffin Pizza

1 tablespoon olive oil

1/4 teaspoon garlic powder

1/4 teaspoon dried oregano

6 English Muffins separated into halves

1/3 cup tomato sauce

8 ounces mozzarella cheese shredded

Preheat oven to 425 degrees.

Separate the English Muffins into halves and place onto a baking sheet nook and crannies side up. Mix together olive oil with garlic powder and oregano. Brush on each English Muffin half. toast in oven for 5 minutes, or until just browned.

1 8oz Cream Cheese

2 tblsp frozen orange juice concentrate

1 7oz jar marshmallow fluff

Fresh fruit

In mixing bowl, combine cream cheese with the juice until smooth. Fold in marshmallow. Serve dip in bowl in the center of a large glass plate surrounded by assorted fruit such as orange sections, pineapple chunks, apple wedges and banana chunks dipped in orange or lemon juice to prevent discolorations, strawberries, grapes, melon, etc.

Mud-Dirt Cups for kids

From Violet

2 cups milk

1 pkg chocolate instant pudding

8 ounce container Cool Whip, thawed

16 ounce pkg Oreo Cookies (crushed)

Also need 8-10 (7 ounce) clear plastic cups Decorations: gummy worms

Pour milk into large mixing bowl.

Add pudding mix.

Mix with whisk until well blended.

Let stand until thick.

Stir in Cool Whip and half of crushed Oreos.

Place 1 tablespoon crushed Oreos into bottom of cups.

Fill cups 3/4 full with pudding mixture.

Top with remaining crushed Oreos.

Refrigerate for one hour and decorate with the gummy worms.
